CANINE TOPICS FOR 4-H AND PUBLIC EDUCATION PROGRAMS

1. Meet The Breeds

- a. Have several different breeds with its owner explaining about the breed, the breed's history and why the breed is important to man's future.
- b. Know the breed's standards.
- c. Where to find the breed's standards.
- d. Know the difference between a "Puppy Miller," a "Backyard Breeder," and a "Reputable Breeder."
- e. What the American Kennel Club (AKC) has to offer for the breeds?
- f. What the United Kennel Club (UKC) has to offer for our breeds?

2. Canine Ownership Responsibility

- a. **Commitment**: A canine is for life...its life. A canine is a pack member. A canine is a family member. A canine is a sentient being.
- b. **Budget**: How much money should you budget each year for your canine's entire life? Can you really afford having a canine as a family member?
- c. Contracts for Your Canine: Get it in writing.
- d. **Dog Laws**: What are the canine laws for your community, your county and your state? Are dog tags needed?
- e. **Homeowner's Insurance**: Just what will your homeowner's insurance policy cover should your canine bite someone?
- f. Loss Prevention: Microchipping and registering your canine with the AVID or AKC Reunited, versus Identification Collar. What should you do should you find your canine not in your home and/or backyard?



- g. Preparing for Your Canine to Come Home: What items do you need to purchase before your canine enters your home?
- h. Canine Proofing Your Home: Get down on hands and knees and take a look at your home from your canine's point of view.
- i. Shelter for Your Canine: Indoor versus Outdoor shelters. How to shelter your canine in severe weather. Bring in a carpenter to demonstrate how to build a dog house.
- Nutrition for Your Canine: Raw food versus commercial food. Poisonous food and plants for canines.
- k. Grooming: Basic grooming tools, bathing techniques, shampoos, tubs and water temperature, drying techniques, trimming of ears, paws and nails, smelling the ears and breath for infections, expressing the anal glands, etc.
- 1. Canine Language: The tones of a bark and the body posture language of a canine.
- m. Teaching Canine Good Manners: "A trained dog is a FREE dog." Dog obedience school, sportsmanship etiquette, and acceptable human and canine behavior towards each other, always clean up after your canine and carry poop bags in your pocket.
- n. Teaching Your Canine Games to Play with You: Equipment needed, where to play, safety issues to discuss.
- o. Canine Safety Rules: Have a discussion regarding the proper procedure to ask permission before you pet a canine you don't know. How to approach a canine. What to do should a strange canine approaches you or attacks you. Why you do not run away from a strange canine. How to stand like a tree and drop like a
- p. Senior Citizen Canines: How are you going to take care of your canine when it's old and gray? When should you let go of your senior canine and allow it to die with dignity?
